# Turkish tanker nets first Amver save of 2008 after sailor calls local pub!

A 61 year old British sailor is counting his blessings after being plucked from the middle of the Atlantic Ocean in the first Amver rescue of 2008.

The Brit, sailing to the United Kingdom on his 38 foot sailboat Padolu, fell and injured his hip 655 nautical miles north east of Bermuda. He notified his favorite pub in the UK who, in turn, notified British search and rescue coordinators in Falmouth, UK who then notified the United States Coast Guard.

Fortunately the United States Coast Guard Atlantic Area Rescue Coordination Center was able to locate the Amver participating tanker Action, a Turkish owned oil tanker sailing to New Haven, CT from Europe. The 822 foot tanker, owned by the Geden Lines of Istanbul, Turkey, was only 5 hours away



when it diverted to assist.

The Action's Captain notified United States Coast Guard rescue coordinators that weather conditions were making rescue operations difficult. "The Padolu is not under command, she cannot use her

engines and cannot proceed to our ship" stated the Action's Captain, "Because of the sea condition there is a very high risk that she can have damage and sink without any rescue operation" he added.

With that, the Captain and crew of the Action rigged a system to allow the injured sailor to climb aboard the 822 foot tanker. The crew of the Action then coordinated with United States Coast Guard flight surgeons and administered ice to the sailor's injuries.

## Greek Amver cargo ship rescues 14 near the Philippines

A routine voyage from Malaysia to Tawi Tawi turned deadly for 81 Philippine passengers whose boat capsized in rough weather. Fortunately the Amver vessel Ioannis K was in the vicinity and rescued 14 survivors.

The Ioannis K, a Greek owned bulk carrier, was sailing towards another Philippine port when they came across the hapless survivors. Men, women, and children were clinging to pieces of wreckage in the Sulu Sea. The Ioannis K quickly reported this distress to the Amver system and commenced search operations.

Captain Mitzelas, skipper of the dry cargo carrier, said his crew observed six people in the water around 2:40 pm local time on February 11. "We immediately commenced search and rescue operations finding another eight survivors at sea" he added. Three of the survivors were children. There were no apparent injuries.

"The survivors said there were originally 95 people in their party, sailing for three days from Malaysia to Tawi Tawi in three wooden boats when they capsized in bad weather" Captain Mitzelas stated. The Ioannis K continued to search for



survivors coming to the stark realization that there were none. At 5:30 the captain resumed passage to Villanueva, Philippines with the survivors on board.

### Amver participating tanker ship rescues 2 near Costa Rica

The Amver participating container ship Milan Express rescued two sailors from their disabled trimaran February 2, 2008 as it drifted 80 nautical miles off the coast of Costa Rica.

United States Coast Guard rescue personnel were alerted to the distress by the wife of one of the sailors. She said the crew emailed her reporting their trimaran, the Siesta Key, was adrift and had lost its sails. Rescue coordinators immediately notified Costa Rican Coast Guard officials and queried the Amver system to locate a merchant vessel near the disabled boat.

While Costa Rican Coast Guard personnel coordinated their re-



sponse assets, the Amver participating container ship Milan Express, owned by Hapag-Lloyd of Hamburg, Germany, was diverted by United States Coast Guard. The Bermuda

flagged container ship, under the command of Captain Adil Ghadiali, steamed almost 10 hours to the distress location and commenced rescue operations.

After less than an hour on scene the Milan Express had both survivors safely onboard. The crew of the Siesta Key was surprised to learn they would have to abandon their boat. "To his credit, Captain Ghadiali with abundant sensitivity and with gentle and patient persuasion explained to us the situation which we faced" said Jack McKenney, Captain of the Siesta Key. #### Sailors lost at sea for 19 days thankful for Amver

On March 16 the M/V Tauranga Star was requested to divert by the United States Coast Guard Eleventh District Rescue Coordination Center to assist a disabled and adrift small boat approximately 110 nautical miles southwest of the Costa Rica/Panama border.

The master and crew of the Tauranga Star were able to rescue

the two sailors and transport them to their next port of call.

The survivors had reportedly been adrift for 19 days and were no doubt happy to see the rescue vessel.

Amver's mission is to quickly provide search and rescue authorities, on demand, accurate information on the positions and characteristics of vessels near a reported distress.
