Amver introduces web based SURPIC request

The United States Coast Guard Amver system has just made the job of search and rescue easier for the entire world. Today, rescue coordination centers around the world can quickly contact the United States Coast Guard and learn what Amver participating commercial vessels may be near a distress position any where in the world.

Search and rescue coordinators simply enter some basic information about the distress such as location, type of distress, and contact information. The request is sent to the United States Coast Guard Atlantic Area Command Center and quickly

processed. United States Coast Guard personnel confirm the requester is a legitimate rescue coor-



dination center and immediately sends a list of Amver vessels nearest the distress location. While this service has been available for many years there has never been a real time method for search and rescue personnel to request it from the United States Coast Guard.

"This unique approach will undoubtedly add another tool for the search and rescue controller and lead to more lives saved at sea" stated Captain Christopher Hall, Chief of Search and Rescue for the United States Coast Guard. "I hope the international community will take advantage of this feature and make it part of their standard operating procedures" he added.

Amver vessel rescues sailor 230 miles from Maui

A 43 year old Wailuku man was rescued by the Amver participating merchant ship CS Victory after his 30 foot sailing vessel began taking on water 230 miles off the coast of Maui December 13.

The sailor notified United States Coast Guard rescue coordinators and activated his 406 MHz emergency beacon after the starboard bow broke off and the center hull began taking on water.

In a multi agency response, the United States Coast Guard diverted a U.S. Navy P-3 Orion along with the USCG Cutter Galveston to assist. It was the 585 foot Panamanian flagged merchant ship CS Victory, however, that arrived on scene and rescued the Hawaiian sailor.

The CS Victory was approximately four hours away from the distress position.

Captain Toshiyuki Fukuhara, master of the CS Victory, braved 20 knot winds to coordinate the rescue operations. Within six hours of the initial notification Captain Fukuhara had the survivor safely on board this ship.

M/V Patagonia receives 2007 AFRAS award

Mr. Benjamin Strong received the prestigious Association for Rescue at Sea Amver award on behalf of the M/V Patagonia during the October, 2007 AFRAS ceremony in Washington, DC.

The Patagonia came to the rescue of the M/V Dayana which sank 115

miles off the coast of Columbia.

The Patagonia directed two other merchant vessels, provided communications to the United States Coast Guard, and rescued six Dayana crewmembers.

Amver tanker rescues 5 from sailboat

Five men on a voyage from Bermuda to Cruz Bay, St. John's suffered a rudder casualty on their sailboat and were rescued by the Amver participating tanker Atlantic Prosperity approximately 195 nautical miles north of St. Thomas.

The men were aboard the sailing vessel Epiphany, sailing from Bermuda to St. John's when they suffered the rudder malfunction. As weather conditions began to deteriorate the master of the Epiphany activated his emergency beacon and was contacted by U.S. Coast Guard personnel. The Coast Guard immediately diverted the Atlantic Prosperity, a

Panamanian flagged tanker, 70 miles from its course to rescue the sailors.



The master of the Atlantic Prosperity, despite 30 knot winds and 10 foot seas, quickly embarked the crew of the Epiphany. The survivors were taken to San Juan, Puerto Rico.

"We are very pleased with our master and crew's professional rescue operation which rescued five sailors from the distressed sailing boat safely under difficult sea conditions" stated Yoshikazu Hirose, spokesperson for the Mitsui O.S.K. Lines, owner of the Atlantic Prosperity.

"The tanker crew was very accommodating" said the crew of the Epiphany "We are very appreciative of the work the tanker and U.S. Coast Guard to coordinate our rescue" they added.

Dead in the water; Amver ships assist disabled vessel

Three Amver ships diverted to assist the 330-foot container ship Agaman which has been dead in the water in 10-foot to 15-foot seas approximately 88 miles southeast of Nantucket.


The Agaman was on a voyage from Canada to Cuba when contamination fouled its fuel supply and seized its engines and generators. Its crew had limited power to operate their radios, no heat and dwindling food stores. According to Captain Karavidas Georgios, the Aegeas's master, "the crew of the Agaman did not have enough food to last the voyage and were keeping warm by wearing extra clothes and tending a fire on the poop deck." There were no reports of injuries.

The 524-foot bulk carrier Dual Confidence's crew immediately diverted to render assistance. They were relieved by the 598-foot Greek-flagged tanker Aegeas, which recently departed Montreal, Canada.

The Aegeas arrived alongside the stricken ship and provided necessary communications to Coast Guard officials.

Amver staff visits Shanghai Maritime Safety Administration

During a recent visit to China, Amver's Benjamin Strong, Marketing Director, toured the Shanghai Maritime Safety Administration's facility.



The highlight of the tour was a demonstration of the Chinese Ship Reporting System which is the People's Republic of China's regional version of Amyer.

In addition to the tour Amver and Shanghai MSA representatives discussed ways to improve communications and information sharing between the two agencies.

Amver, sponsored by the United States Coast Guard, is a unique computer based, voluntary ship reporting system used worldwide by search and rescue authorities to arrange for assistance to persons in distress at sea. With Amver, rescue coordinators can identify participating ships in the area of distress and divert the best suited ship to respond.

Amver's mission is to quickly provide search and rescue authorities, on demand, accurate information on the positions and characteristics of vessels near a reported distress.
